While your degree planning is directed by the specific requirements for your chosen concentration and minor, it is also driven by your own personal interests; therefore, it is most effective when you are the master of your own academic planning.

Please be aware of all prerequisites, corequisites, and other registration regulations for all courses required within your degree. Program planning can be very effective to identify potential courses needed in addition to specific requirements. Refer to section 4.0 in the *Concordia Calendar* for more information regarding registration policies. You are responsible for registering in and completing the courses necessary to obtain your degree. The *Concordia Calendar* is the final authority regarding program requirements and academic regulations.

Core course requirements may be fulfilled through both concentration and minor requirements; however, the same course may not be counted toward both concentration and minor requirements. (Example: courses taken toward a History minor simultaneously fulfill the Social Science core).

Concentration Requirements

24-30 credits required to include:

- PHIL 102 or 202
- PHIL 125
- PHIL 240
- PHIL 241
- One 400-level Philosophy
- 9-15 credits of unspecified Philosophy courses with a maximum of 3 credits at the junior level.

Note: Students concentrating in Philosophy must take a minimum of 15 credits of Philosophy at Concordia.

Sample Program

Below is a sample sequence of courses for your degree. Keep in mind that this is only an example; you may find a different sequence works best for you.

*To earn a 3-year Bachelor of Arts degree, students must present credit in a 30-level or equivalent (e.g., French 30 or FR 102) Language Other than English (LOE). If you must complete a 102-level LOE to meet this requirement, we recommend you take it in the first year of your program.
